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Federal govt allocation to Kelantan up by 30% to RM762m and Terengganu by 28% to RM2.02b last year compared with 2023

BACHOK: The Madani government has never marginalised opposition-led states in the allocation of funds, said Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim.

He said the allocation to PAS-led Kelantan has increased by 30% to RM762 million last year compared with RM588 million in 2023, while the allo-RM588 million in 2023, while the allo-cation to Terengganu also recorded a 28% increase to RM2.02 billion last year from RM1.57 billion the previous year. "This increase includes grants under Marris (Malaysian Road Records Information System), Tahap (Economic, Infrastructure and Welfare Development Pasca Cranto, pag. capita

Development-Based Grants), per capita grants, compassionate money and other allocations.

"This allocation is the main source of state revenue, especially for Kelantan and Terengganu, which only generate around RM500 million and RM250 million from their own state resources, respectively," he said at the Kelantan-level Aidifitri Madani 2025 celebration at Pantai Irama yesterday.

Anwar said the federal government has additionally approved RM25 mil-lion for Kelantan and RM60 million for Terengganu this year for poverty eradication.

He added that the federal govern-ment has decided to expedite flood mitigation projects in Kelantan to address the state's perennial flooding problem.

"This includes exploring new meth-ods not only to tackle the flood issue but also to resolve water shortages dur-

"Kelantan has identified several key projects, and this year, I have decided that the phased flood mitigation pro-jects, despite their high cost, must be expedited. We don't want to continue witnessing yearly floods, with the flood situation remaining unmanageable while governments come and go, including the federal government. "That is why I have asked the Energy Transition and Water Transformation

Transition and Water Transformation Ministry, the Economy Ministry and Finance Ministry to look into several

new approaches. In this state, some-times the water overflows excessively, causing floods, and then in the follow-ing months, it's completely dry, with no wäter.

"Allah has given us strength, effort and technology. Can't the overflowing floodwaters be stored for the dry sea-son? Of course it can."

son? Of course it can." Meanwhile, Anwar said in a post on his Facebook page that the federal gov-ernment has agreed to proceed with the preliminary works for five priority

the preliminary works for five priority projects in Pahang, Bernama reported. He said these include the construc-tion of the Bukit Rangin elevated inter-change, Kuantan-Chukai road, upgrad-ing of the Kuantan-Segamat road span-ning 51km and Package Six of the Central Spine Road between Karak and Simpang Pelangai in Bentong. Anwar said the other two projects are the ungrading of the road from

are the upgrading of the road from Kampung Padang to the East Coast Highway 1 traffic light junction (Phase 2), and the construction of a new Type 2), and the construction of a new Type 7 Health Clinic with 10 units of Class F quarters at Pos Lenjang in Kuala Lipis.

He said the decision was made during a special meeting on Pahang's development, which he chaired with Menteri Besar Datuk Seri Wan Rosdy Wan Ismail and the state leadership.

Role of PM in judicial appointments to advise King: Expert

KUALA LUMPUR: The prime minister's involvement in the process of appointing judges is not aimed at undermining judicial independence but at ensuring that the government remains informed of developments within the judiciary, said constitutional expert Assoc Prof Datuk Dr

constitutional expert Assoc Prof Datuk Dr Shamrahayu Ab Aziz. She said the PM's role in advising the Yang di-Pertuan Agong on judicial appointments is enshrined in Article 122B of the Federal Constitution, a provision that has existed since 1957, reported Bernama.

"One of the reasons the provision was established is to ensure some level of

government involvement in matters related to the judiciary. "There is clear separation of powers between the judiciary and the executive, with the prime minister and the King as head of state, representing the executive branch" branch

She said this in response to a speech by Chief Justice Tun Tengku Maimun Tuan Mat at the 24th Commonwealth Law Conference in Malta

The Chief Justice had expressed support for proposals to amend the Judicial Appointments Commission (JAC) Act 2009 to remove the prime minister's role from the

judicial appointment process. Tengku Maimun argued that eliminating the PM's involvement would enhance the impartiality of the process, ensuring that appointments are made solely on merit and are free from any perception of political

Interference. Under Article 122B of the Federal Under Article 122B of the Federal Constitution, judges are appointed by the King, acting on the advice of the PM and after consultation with the Conference of Rulers.

However, Shamrahayu pointed out that the JAC Act already limits the already prime minister's influence.

"The Act stipulates that the PM may only recommend or advise the Yang di-Pertuan Agong based on candidates proposed by the commission. "Although Article 122B grants the prime

minister significant constitutional authority, this power is moderated by mechanisms within the JAC.

She cautioned that removing the prime minister's role would have far-reaching legal implications and should be carefully studied before any changes are made. Bernama

Mega cleanup in housing sites near Putra Heights disaster zone

KUALA LUMPUR: More than 4,000 personnel from various agencies, have been mobilised in a large-scale cleanup operation in areas affected by the recent gas pipeline

In areas affected by the recent gas pipeline explosion in Putra Heights, Subang Jaya. Selangor Menteri Besar Datuk Seri Amirudin Shari said the two-day operation, which began yesterday, covers Putra Heights and the neighbouring Kampung Kuala Sungai Baru. It involves around 600 volunteers and personnel from government agencies and from government other organisations.

"A major part of our focus is on Kampung Kuala Sungai Baru, especially in cleaning public areas and residents' homes that were affected. Clean-up work in Putra Heights had already begun once police granted access," he told a press conference yesterday.

The integrated operation involves 264 vehicles and heavy machinery, including water jet trucks, tankers, roll-on roll-off trucks, backhoe loaders, road sweepers, wood chippers and sky lifts.

Amirudin added that 307 homes have been cleared for reoccupation, with more expected to be ready soon.

"Next week, we'll start focusing on providing rental homes and repairing damaged houses,"

Addressing concerns that more attention was given to the Putra Harmoni area than Kampung Melayu, Amirudin clarified that clean up efforts in Kampung Kuala Sungai Baru could only start after police granted clearance a few days ago. "The housing layout in the area is less structured compared with standard housing cathotic built to encedifications on it contine

TalentCorp Group CEO Thomas Mathew said: "We're at a pivotal moment. Around 620,000 jobs are expected to be significantly impacted over the next three to five years across

over the next three to five years across 10 core sectors."

"As these industries evolve, it's vital

But it's not all bleak. "AI isn't just taking jobs, it's creating them," he said. "We've identified 60 emerging roles that will define the workforce in the

Survey reflects this shift – while 73% of Malaysians anticipate AI disruption, higher than the global average,

To help Malaysians navigate this shift, TalentCorp has launched MyMahir.my, a centralised digital platform connecting users to career mobility tools, industry-led training and insights on emerging roles. "We built MyMahir.my to give every Malaysian a fair shot to see what jobs are coming, what skills they'll need and where to get them," Mathew said. The platform is backed by on-ground initiatives like the National

ground initiatives like the National Structured Internship Programme and Young Employable Students, aimed at bridging academia-industry gaps and preparing youth for AI-driven careers. For workers facing displacement, MyMahir's Future Skills Talent Council partners with industry leaders to tailor training to real-world needs.

training to real-world needs. In 2024, the E&E sector programme alone upskilled 500 workers, leading to salary hikes of 5 to 15%.

TalentCorp plans to reach 15,000 participants across 18 sectors this year, including new entries like the data centre sector launched in February. This nationwide upskilling push is backed by Human Resources Ministry

funding. In 2023, Human Resources Minister

Steven Sim announced RM3 billion for workforce development across TalentCorp, HRD Corp, Socso and the Manpower Department.

In 2024, an additional RM20 million was earmarked to train 5,000 Malaysians in AI, cybersecurity and data science.

Deputy Minister in the Prime Minister's Department (Religious Affairs) Dr Zulkifli Hasan said the Haj is a special invitation from Allah SWT to His chosen servants, and should therefore be approached with sincerity and deep devotion.

He cautioned against the growing habit among some pilgrims of frequently posting on social media – including taking selfies in front of the *Kaabah* or going live on platforms such as TikTok – which could distract from

Tiki ok – which could distract from the true purpose of the pilgrimage. "At times, this can be disturbing to other pilgrims who are concentrating on their worship. "My advice to this year's *Duyufurrahman* (guests of Allah) is to focus entirely on seeking Allah): pleasure, not on glorifying oneself

for social media popularity through likes or views," he told Bernama.

Zulkifli stressed that the core of Haj lies in sincere worship for the sake of *Allah* SWT, adding that Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) prayed that his pilgrimage remain free of *riya*' and *sum*'ah (showing

off to seek attention or praise). As such, he advised pilgrims to refrain from updating social media and instead make full use of their time in the Holy Land by priortising acts of worship such as prayers,

supplication and remembrance of Allah. He also reminded pilgrims

to make sufficient physical preparations for the journey, which involves considerable movement, including walking between their hotels and the mosque during rituals such as *tawaf* and *sa'i*, as well as while at Arafah, Muzdalifah and Mina. As their final preparations,

Zulkifli encouraged all pilgrims to attend the Perdana Haj course organised by Lembaga Tabung

Haji (TH), which runs until May 4 at 22 locations nationwide. "The course serves as a final

refresher and provides practical simulations of key rituals such as tawaf, sa'i, stoning of the jamrah, and donning the *ihram* for male pilgrims. It also includes health tips and allows participants to consult directly with TH officers and Haj guides," he said

Return of money to investors depends on probe outcome and proof of ownership: Crime analyst

PETALING JAYA: As authorities dig deeper into the "Pelaburan MBI" investment scam that is suspected to have been operated as a Ponzi scheme, a crime analyst has said investors may have a obstat recognoring their menut.

analyst has said investors may have a shot at recovering their money. However, a lot depends on the outcome of the investigation and the ability of the victims to provide solid proof of ownership. Crime analyst Datuk Shahul Hamid Abdul Rahim said recovered assets are unically unturned to unified unified and

typically returned to verified victims once a case is resolved, but success depends on

a case is resolved, but success depends on solid evidence and victim cooperation. "At this stage, the seized assets remain in police custody as they are considered crucial evidence in the ongoing probe. "Affected investors may need to come forward, lodge a formal statement with authorities and submit supporting documents to assist the investigation." He said this step is vital for building a solid case, boosting the chances of recovering funds and enlisting the

victims as witnesses. He also said police typically assess how much each individual invested to determine the extent of possible reimbursement based on original funds. "However, if only part of the investment can be verified with sufficient evidence, then only that amount would be considered for return. We will have to wait until the probe concludes." Crime analyst Datuk Seri Dr Akhbar Satar said the process of reclaiming investment funds is often considered legally complex and uncertain.

legally complex and uncertain. He said a big hurdle lies in proving ownership of the funds and validating the legitimacy of an investor's claims.

"It is difficult to (determine) legally. If there is insufficient evidence to back the

there is insufficient evidence to back the claims, the seized assets may ultimately be forfeited by the government." He urged the public to be wary of investment schemes that promise unusually high returns. "It is crucial to verify whether a company is genuine and recognised, especially by Bank Negara Malaysia." A retired senior police officer,

speaking on condition of anonymity, said many individuals fall victim to dubious schemes because they are overly trusting, even when clear red flags are present. He added that Ponzi schemes often

depend on charismatic individuals to give

depend on charismatic individuals to give the scam a sense of credibility. "The public must exercise extreme caution as these individuals are exploiting others for financial gain," he warned, expressing concern over the billions lost and the recent arrests involving high-profile figures. On Friday, *theSun* reported that eight individuals, including four believed to hold the title "Datuk", were arrested for alleged involvement in a Ponzi investment scheme. Police seized and froze assets linked to

investment scheme. Police seized and froze assets linked to the operation, worth over RM3.17 billion. Among the seized items were 638 bank and stock trading accounts, involving RM1.16 billion, 35 properties estimated to be worth RM2 billion, 10 luxury vehicles, 12 high-end wristwatches, large sums of foreign and local currencies, as well as jewellery, designer handhage phones lawtons and designer handbags, phones, laptops and key documents.

It is understood that the scheme had been operating for several years, allegedly defrauding thousands of investors with promises of high returns.

Aidilfitri traffic operation records reduction in fatal crashes

KUALA LUMPUR: The number of fatal road crashes nationwide dropped by 41% during Op Selamat 24, held in conjunction with Aidilfitri celebrations from March 29 to April 3.

Deputy IGP Datuk Seri Ayob Khan Mydin Pitchay said 77 fatal collisions were recorded this year, compared with 131 during the same period last year. "The number of deaths also declined to

85 this year, a reduction of 41% from 144 recorded last year."

However, the total number of road

crashes increased by 4% from 9,451 last year to 9,859 this year. He said the increase could be attributed

to the growing number of registered vehicles in Malaysia, which now exceeds 36.6 million.

Police also identified 432 hotspots and 122 blackspots across major highways, federal and state roads, city streets and other roads nationwide.

"Roadblocks at high-risk areas proved to be an effective measure in reducing crashes at such locations."

He added that 91,727 traffic summonses were issued during the operation, which is a 1% increase from 90,640 issued during Op Selamat 22.

Motorcyclists and pillion riders continue to make up the highest number of fatalities, although the figure dropped by 44% from 93

Last year to 52 this year. Ayob Khan said this year's Op Selamat also focused on securing homes left unattended during the festive period. Police received 12,773 *balik kampung* notices from the public, compared with

10,869 last year, while 76,274 patrols were conducted nationwide, an increase of 27% compared with last year.

These included 37,429 multi-purpose vehicle patrols, 14,176 by motorcycle patrol

units, 20,311 by local station teams and 4,358 other patrols. A total of 6,957 personnel from the Traffic Investigation and Enforcement Department, along with 2,742 personnel from the Crime Prevention and Community Safety Department, were directly involved in Op Selamat 24. – Bernama

S'pore PM Wong to defend seat

PAP finalises election candidates list

SINGAPORE: The city-state's ruling People's Action Party (PAP) has finalised its candidates for the upcoming general election, with Prime Minister Lawrence Wong set to defend his Marsiling-Yew Tee Group Parasenating Constituency (CPC) Group Representation Constituency (GRC)

seat with the same slate of incumbents. Wong, who is also PAP secretary-gen-eral, announced at a press conference yesterday that he will contest together with Senior Minister of State for Defence

and Manpower Zaqy Mohamad, North West District Mayor Alex Yam and Hany Soh in the four-member GRC. Wong and Yam have served in the GRC

Wong and Yam nave served in the GRC since it was formed in 2015, while Zaqy and Soh joined later. The quartet won the seat in 2020 with a total of 69,813 votes (63.18%) against the Singapore Democratic Party candidates. There are two types of electoral divisions in Singapore – the Single Member Constituency (SMC) and the GRC. During an election voters of a GRC During an election, voters of a GRC vote for a group of individuals – between three and six – to be their Members of Parliament, who must either be from the

same party or all independents. Wong said that the PAP will field more than 30 new candidates at the election, which must be held by November – to renew and refresh the PAP and bring in new ideas and energy to the party. "This is the largest slate of new faces we've introduced in recent history. You will get to know all our new candidates in the coming daws, as each CBC and SMC

the coming days, as each GRC and SMC unveils its candidates," he said.

Wong said the election will be held at a time of great global uncertainty, and he left it to Singaporeans to decide on the team that they trust.

"There is a gathering storm and we are

flying straight into turbulence. In such conditions, who you have in the cockpit on the team they trust to navigate the storm and chart the way forward." Wong said he takes the responsibility

seriously, as the stakes are high, including for Singapore's place in the world. He added that the PAP's plans will be

unveiled in a manifesto that will be published soon

This will be Wong's first election as the prime minister and the PAP's secre-tary-general. More than 2.75 million Singaporeans will be eligible to vote in this year's election. - Bernama



Japan prime minister warns of divided world

OSAKA: Japan's prime minister urged the OSAKA: Japan's prime minister urged the importance of unity in a world plagued by "divisions" at a futuristic but also tradition-steeped opening ceremony for the World Expo yesterday. Everything from a Mars meteorite to a beating heart grown from stem cells will be showcased during the six-month event, which opens to the public today. The vast waterfront site in Osaka will bost more than 160 countries, regions

host more than 160 countries, regions and organisations.

"The world now faces the crisis over many different divisions," Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba told the opening ceremony. "It is extremely significant that people

from all over the world gather and face the question of life in this era, exposing ourselves to state-of-the-art technology and diverse cultures and ways of thinking," Ishiba said.

The Expo is also known as a World's Fair and the phenomenon, which brought the Eiffel Tower to Paris, began with London's 1851 Crystal Palace exhibition and is held

1851 Crystal Palace exhibition and is held every five years. Most pavilions, each more outlandishly designed than the last, are encircled by the world's largest wooden architectural structure, a towering latticed "Grand Ring" designed as a symbol of unity. An array of colourful imagery symbolising life, birth and nature adorned a massive screen in a minutes-long video at yesterday's ceremony, with foreign dignitaries and Japan's royal family in attendance. attendance. The ceremony displayed a mix of

technology, including its Al-powered "virtual human" master of ceremonies, and tradition that included Japanese kabuki dancing and *taiko* drums.

Emperor Naruhito said he hopes Expo 2025 will "serve as an opportunity for people worldwide to respect the lives not only of their own but also of others'

Heightened security was put to the test hours before the ceremony when a suspicious box was found at the nearby

Suspicious box was found at the nearby Kyoto train station and reported to police. A bomb squad was sent to the scene, causing train delays, but it was found that the box contained "foreign-made sweets". Osaka last hosted the Expo in 1970, when Japan was booming and its technology was the envy of the world. It attracted 64 million people, a record until Shanchai in 2010. Shanghai in 2010.

However, Expos have been criticised for their temporary nature, and Osaka's man-made island will be cleared to make way for a casino resort after October.

Opinion polls also show low levels of enthusiasm for the Expo among the public. So far 8.7 million advance tickets have been sold, below the pre-sales target of 14 million.

Japan is also experiencing a tourism boom, meaning accommodation in Osaka
 near hotspot Kyoto and home to the Universal Studios theme park – is often fully booked. - AFP

Australian judge quits Hong Kong top court

HONG KONG: An Australian judge has resigned from Hong Kong's highest court amid a year-long exodus of overseas jurists, following Beijing's imposition of a sweeping national security law on the finance hub.

The city's judiciary said on Friday that Robert French had cut short his term, which was meant to expire in May next year, adding that the court's operation will not be affected.

Hong Kong is a common law jurisdiction separate from mainland China and invites overseas judges to hear cases at its Court of Final Appeal.

Their presence has been seen as a bell-wether for the rule of law since the former British colony was handed back to China in 1997. French said in a statement that the role of

overseas judges has "become increasingly anachronistic and arguably cosmetic", according to the *South China Morning Post*. The judiciary said French "reafirmed his continued respect for the independence and

integrity of all of the judges on the Court of Final Appeal" in his resignation letter.

A Hong Kong government spokesperson "expressed regret" at French's resignation and thanked him for his contributions. French, a former chief justice of the High

Court of Australia, first joined the Hong Kong bench in 2017.

Beijing passed a national security law on the former British colony in 2020, following huge protests the year before. – AFP

UN seeks US\$275m in aid for quake relief

NEW YORK: The United Nations launched an appeal on Friday for US\$275 million (RM1.2 bil-lion) in donations urgently needed to aid more than one million people affected by the recent earthquake that devastated Myanmar.

The new appeal report warns that only around 5% has been funded of an estimated US\$1.1 billion needed for the previous humanitarian aid plan for 5.5 million people. "With new and increasing needs, additional

resources are urgently required," the report said.

The new appeal would target the most vulnerable 11 million people, with an emphasis on women and girls "who face higher risks of gender-based violence, food insecurity and

lack of access to reproductive health," it said. According to the UN, more than 6.3 million people are in urgent need of assistance in the areas hardest hit by the magnitude 7.7 earth-quake on March 28, which killed more than 3,600 people. – AFP





GAZA: Hundreds of thousands of Gaza City residents have lost their main source of clean water in the past week after supplies from Israel's water utility were cut by the Israeli army's renewed offensive.

Many now have to walk, sometimes for miles, to get water containers filled after the Israeli military's offensive in after the Israeli military's offensive in Gaza City's eastern Shejaia neighbourhood, in the north of the Strip, damaged the pipeline operated by state-owned Mekorot. "Since morning, I have been waiting for water," said 42-year-old Gaza woman Faten Nassar.

woman Faten Nassar. "There are no stations and no trucks coming. There is no water. The crossings are closed. God willing, the war will end safely and peacefully." Israel's military said in a statement it was in contact with relevant organisations to coordinate the repair of what it called a malfunction of the porthere pipeling.

It said a second pipeline supplying southern Gaza was still operating, adding that the water supply system "is based on various water sources, including wells and desalination facilities distributed throughout the Gaza Strip"

Israel ordered Shejaia residents to evacuate last week as it launched an offensive that has seen several districts bombed. The military has said previously it was operating against "terror infrastructure" and had killed a senior leader.

Clean sources become increasingly scarce

The northern pipeline had been sup-plying 70% of Gaza City's water since the destruction of most of its wells dur-

"The situation is very difficult and things are getting more complicated, especially when it comes to people's daily lives and their daily water needs, whether for cleaning, disinfecting, and even cooking and drinking," said Husni Mhana, the municipality's spokesper-

"We are now living in a real thirst crisis in Gaza City, and we could face a difficult reality in the coming days if

Most of Gaza's 2.3 million people have become internally displaced by the war, with many making daily trips on foot to fill plastic containers with water from the few wells still functioning in remote areas and even these do not guarantee clean supplies. Water for drinking, cooking and washing has increasingly become a luxury for Gaza residents following the start of the war between Israel and Hamas.

More than 50,800 Palestinians have been killed in Israel's military offensive

Many residents across the enclave queue for hours to get water containers filled, which usually is not enough for their daily needs. "I walk long distances. I get tired. I am

old, I'm not young to walk around every day to get water," said 64-year-old Adel Al-Hourani.

The Gaza Strip's only natural source of water is the Coastal Aquifer Basin, which runs along the eastern Mediterranean coast from the northern Sinai Peninsula in Egypt, through Gaza and into Israel. But its salty tap water is depleted, with

up to 97% deemed unfit for consumption due to salinity, over-extraction and pollution.

The Palestinian Water Authority said most of its wells had been rendered inoperable. – Reuters

US can deport student protester, says judge

JENA: An immigration judge ruled on Friday that a pro-Palestinian student protester, a US permanent resident detained by the Trump administration, can

be deported, his lawyer said. Assistant Chief Immigration Judge Jamee Comans, based in the state of Louisiana, said the federal government had met its burden to prove it had grounds to deport Mahmoud Khalil, according to a

statement by his attorney. "Today, we saw our worst fears play out: Mahmoud was subject to a charade of due process, a flagrant violation of his right to a fair hearing, and a weaponisation of immigration law to suppress dissent. This is not over and our fight continues," Khalil's attorney Marc van der Hout. said

Khalil is not yet scheduled for

deportation and the judge gave his attor-neys until April 23 to seek a waiver. The Columbia University student, a prominent face of the protest movement that erupted in response to Israel's war in Gaza, is married to a US citizen. He was arrested and taken to Louisiana, sparking protests. Several other foreign student protesters have been similarly targeted

similarly targeted. Comans had ordered the government

to spell out its case against Khalil, who the government is seeking to deport on the

government as seeking to deport on the grounds that his protest activities are a threat to national security. In a letter to the court, Secretary of State Marco Rubio insisted that Khalits activism could hurt Washington's foreign policy.

But he declined to argue formally that the Algeria-born Palestinian student was aligned to Hamas, as officials have told journalists. The undated letter instead referred to

Khalit's "participation and roles" in allegedly "anti-Semitic protests and disruptive activities which fosters a hostile environment for Jewish students in the United States"

It made no reference to any alleged crime

"I would like to quote what you said last time, that there's nothing that's more important to this court than due process rights and fundamental fairness. Clearly what we witnessed today, neither of these principles were present," Khalil told the court according to his legal team. – AFP

Iran delegation in Oman for nuclear talks

MUSCAT: Iran's top diplomat arrived in Oman yesterday and began laying the groundwork for high-stakes nuclear talks with the United States that are unfolding under the threat of military action. Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi flew in ahead of the foes' highest-level discussions

since an international agreement on Iran's nuclear programme crumbled after US President Donald Trump pulled out during

President Donald Trump pulled out during his first term in office. "Our intention is to reach a fair and honourable agreement from an equal position," Araghchi said in a video. Iran, weakened by Israel's pummelling of its allies Hezbollah in Lebanon and Hamas in Carao is coolving rollof from constituers

Gaza, is seeking relief from sanctions hobbling its economy.

Tehran has agreed to the meetings despite baulking at Trump's "maximum pressure" campaign of ramping up sanc-tions and repeated military threats.

uons and repeated military threats. The US, hand-in-glove with Israel, wants to stop Tehran from ever getting close to developing a nuclear bomb. The two sides are already at odds over the format of the talks, with the US calling them "direct" while the Iranians insist on using an intermediary.

using an intermediary. After arriving in Muscat, Araghchi set out Iran's position on the "indirect" talks with Oman's Foreign Minister Badr bin Hamad Al Busaidi, an Iranian statement said.

"Araghchi provided the Omani foreign minister with Iran's basis and positions on the talks for transmission to the other side," Iran's Foreign Ministry said.

Iran's Foreign Ministry said. Trump's special envoy Steve Witkoff is expected to lead the US team in Oman, which has long played a mediating role between Iran and Western countries. Witkoff told *The Wall Street Journal* that "our position today" starts with demanding that Iran dismantle its nuclear programme. "That decord" mean work out poing to

"That doesn't mean we're not going to find other ways to find a compromise," he said. – AFP

Get moving on Ukraine, Putin told

MOSCOW: US envoy Steve Witkoff wrapped up his latest talks with Russia's Vladimir Putin on Friday, after President Donald Trump urged his Russian counterpart to move quickly to end what he said was the "senseless war" with Ukraine. Trump has been pressing Moscow and Kyiv to agree a ceasefire deal but has failed to extract any major concessions from the Kremlin, despite repeated negotiations. The US leader told NBC News last month

Kremlin, despite repeated negotiations. The US leader told NBC News last month he was "pissed off" with his Russian counterpart, while top US diplomat Marco Rubio warned last week that Washington would not tolerate "endless negotiations". "Russia has to get moving," Trump wrote on his Truth Social platform, adding that the conflict, which began in February 2022 when Moscow sent troops into Ukraine, was "senseless" and "should have never happened" happened".

Kyiv and several of its Western allies suspect Russia of stalling the talks. Trump's post came just before Witkoff's meeting with Putin at the presidential library in Saint Petersburg. The Kremlin said afterwards only that the

meeting had taken place and "focused on various aspects of the Ukrainian settlement".

Spokesman Dmitry Peskov had said earlier that he expected no diplomatic "breakthroughs" from the talks.

He also said "maybe" to a question about whether a possible meeting between Putin and Trump would be discussed. -AFP

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What's the point: Memberships, loyalty points and rewards

HE TikTok trend "Money will come back, but memories won't" has become a cautionary tale for many, particularly Malaysian youths. While it's tempting to live in the moment and indulge in the latest trends, this mentality has led many to overspend and ignore the importance of long-term financial planning. With the introduction of Account 3 for

KWSP (EPF) in 2024, the savings culture has shifted for members under the age of 55. Previously, funds were split into Account 1 and Account 2 with a 70:30 ratio. Now, Account 3 allows withdrawals at any time, which has led to a worrying trend of young people accessing their savings without thinking about the future.

The Malaysia Financial Planning Council (MFPC) survey revealed that many millennials lack proper money management skills. Alarmingly, those with lower incomes spend 21% to 27% of their earnings on entertainment, which leaves them with little to save. As a result, saving money remains one of the top financial

worries for many. Despite the government's efforts to improve financial literacy, many young Malaysians are tuning out the advice and continuing to live beyond their means. As time passes, debts accumulate, creating a cycle of financial distress.

HY Tan, founder of DoitDuit on Insta-gram and a full-time broker, states that personal loans and credit card debt are Malaysia's leading causes of bankruptcy, with interest rates ranging from 7% to 18%. "Many people take on debt or credit card loans for immediate satisfaction without understanding the long-term impact, Tan explains.

So, how much should you save to secure your financial future? Here's how you can build a solid foundation

Set aside 20% monthly

Having closely studied the financial land-scape in Malaysia, Tan revealed that we should aim to save at least 20% to 30% of our monthly income. This percentage helps us build a financial cushion for emergencies, invest for long-term growth and work towards our financial goals. "However, the percentage may vary depending on our financial commitments. The key is to maintain a consistent saving habit.

There is also a common misconception that as long as you save roughly 20% of your salary, it's fine to overspend the remaining amount. "The biggest mistake is saving whatever is left after spending. The right way is to save before spending, not vice versa. Saving is a habit that requires discipline."

Tan also suggests that if you lack the discipline to save, consider automating your savings. Set up monthly standing instructions with your bank to transfer a percentage of your income to another account as soon as you receive it.

The rule of thumb

Diving deeper into the points and consider-ing the rising cost of living and inflation, Malaysians should ensure they save ef-Malaysians should ensure they save ef-fectively while managing their everyday expenses. "Start practising the 50/30/20 budgeting rule," says Tan. Allocate 50% of your income to needs (rent, food, transport), 30% to wants

(entertainment, travel), and 20% to savings and investments.

"Track your expenses weekly, daily and monthly to cut down on unnecessary spending, such as unused subscriptions or lifestyle inflation costs," advised Tan. Experts also suggest leveraging cashback and rewards, such as using e-wallets or cashback credit cards.

Ensure you pay your credit card bill on time to avoid penalties and extra charges that could financially harm you.

Prep for the future

Saving money for future milestones like marriage, buying a car, or purchasing property requires clear goals, discipline and smart planning. By understanding where your money goes each month, you can identify areas where you can cut back, such as reducing dining out, limiting impulse buys or cancelling unused subscriptions. MALAYSIA has witnessed a significant shift in consumer spending habits in recent years, particularly with the advent of Buy Now, Pay Later (BNPL) schemes. Let's start with a classic. Bananas are readily available across Ma-laysia and often the first fruit that comes to mind post-workout and with good reason. A medium-sized banana provides around 32mg of magnesium, plus potassium, Vitamin B6 and fibre.

How to eat it: Enjoy it raw, sliced on toast with peanut butter, blended into smoothies or baked into muffins.

Guavas: Local

powerhouses Often seen at roadside stalls or sliced up with a little sprinkle of asam boi, guavas are a mag-nesium-rich local gem. One raw guava contains about 36mg of magnesium and a hefty dose of Vitamin C and antioxidants.

How to eat it: Best enjoyed raw with a pinch of salt or chili powder, or juiced fresh (just skip the sugar).

Papayas: Digestive buddies

Another tropical wonder is that papayas are gentle on the stomach and generous in nutrients. One medium slice gives you about 30mg of magnesium. The enzymes help with digestion, making this a great option after a heavy meal. How to eat it: Serve chilled with a squeeze of

lime, blend into breakfast bowls or pair with yogurt.

Avocados: The creamy contender

While technically a fruit, avocados feel like they belong in their own category. A single avocado offers a whopping 58mg of magnesium, along with healthy fats and fibre. Though not native, locally grown avocados are increasingly available in Cameron Highlands and Sabah.

How to eat it: Mashed on toast, sliced in salads, turned into guacamole or even blended into smoothies.

Figs: The imported delight Fresh figs aren't common, but they're worth grabbing when in season (or found dried). Four dried figs can offer around 50mg of magnesium. Figs also bring calcium, iron and a natural sweetness that curbs dessert cravings.

How to eat it: Add chopped dried figs to oats or salads or eat as a midday snack with nuts.

Ways to work magnesium fruits into your diet

- Mix it up: A banana-papaya smoothie is both hydrating and magnesium-rich.
- Prep snack boxes: Pre-slice guava and papaya for easy snacking on busy days.

Most who read this ignored the following sentence: "Most of this quantity is contained in prepared foods." Prepared foods mean all food contains water, especially vegetables and fruits.

Evidence: Our bodies absorb 20% of daily fluid intake from our food consumption, and many fruits and vegetables, such as watermelon and spinach, are almost 100% water by weight.

More megapixels mean more details and are noticeable on larger prints, but image quality is not guaranteed. Evidence: The quality of a camera is decisively

influenced by the sensor and lens quality, not only by its megapixel resolution. The result will still be bad if a lousy lens is used on a high-megapixel camera.



MYTH 3: Ostriches bury their heads in the sand when scared THE TRUTH: Ostriches engage in this action to eat or lie down

The image of the head-burying ostrich is so ingrained in popular culture that it is often accepted as fact without question. The actual behaviours - dust bathing, egg tending, listening for predators- are less dramatic and widely known. The myth likely arose from a Roman author, Pliny the Elder (23-79 AD), who wrote that the ostrich instinctively buries its head when in terror. This misconception is associated extensively with the idiom 'bury its head in the sand'.

Evidence: Misinterpretations of these behaviours are oftentimes made by observers who do not fully understand ostrich habits. Instead, ostriches do this with their head to the horizon when laying down or feeding.

MYTH 4: Letting your car idle to warm up on a cold day is good for the engine THE TRUTH: It is unnecessary to let your car idle to warm up the engine

People believe that allowing their car to idle for an extended period before driving is necessary to warm up the engine and prevent damage. Prolonged idling for modern automobiles with electronic fuel injection is typically unnecessary and harmful. Start your vehicle and begin driving it slowly. As a result, the engine and other fluids can warm up more rapidly and effectively under mild load.

Evidence: Carlist indicates the negative impacts of excessive idling on engine wear and fuel efficiency, and many modern car manuals recommend against extended idling.





MYTH 5: Bulls are enraged by the colour red THE TRUTH: Bulls charge whenever they feel provoked

Bulls, like most cattle, are essentially red-green colorblind. The aggressive whipping movement of the matador's cape provokes the charge, not its colour. Flailing the cape multiple times in the bull's direction by the matador, or the leading performer in a bullfight, irritates the bull and ultimately switches its 'fight or flight' response. The adrenal gland releases the hormone adrenaline during this response to prime the body for survival. Many mistakenly believe it is triggered by red. Rather than that, the act of provocation starts the fight in the bull. **Evidence:** Experiments using capes of different colors have shown that bulls react to more regardless of the actory.

Kylie Minogue: The pop icon who endures

N today's modern pop landscape, going viral online is the equivalent of striking gold, often turning lesserknown artistes into household A names. But in the case of pop icon Kylie Minogue, going viral with her 2023 hit Padam Padam didn't just bring about a renewed resurgence. It proved that female pop stars over the age of 50 could still dominate the industry.

It's been 37 years since the release of her first single, a cover of Little Eva's *The Loco-Motion* that rose to the top of the charts in 1988. In a recent BBC Eras interview, she mentioned that she hadn't decided to pursue music – she decided to record several music demos to land more acting roles since she was already popular as Charlene on the Australian soap opera, Neiahbours.

Throughout her illustrious career, Kylie has faced and conquered numerous hurdles. When she first started, she was pejoratively referred to as the singing budgie by critics who said she wouldn't last. Naysayers often implied that she lacked musical depth or artistic control and was merely a product of the pop machine, singing whatever was handed to her.

The arduous road to artistic

credibility She desired more creative freedom as the nineties progressed, looking to experiment and challenge herself, which resulted in her 1997 album *Impossible Princess*. The album embraced then-leftfield genres such as drum-and-bass, trip-hop and even a tinge of Britpop, a total departure from the sumy bubblegum pop everyone uncertainty of the sum of was used to.

This became her most misunderstood body of work as critics dubbed her Indie Kylie, considering her a fraud as they felt the output wasn't authentic to her. The album was poorly received and critics at the time said that her career was over, which caused her to consider retiring. It's worth noting that retrospective reviews of the album were positive, as contemporary music critics commended her daringness to deviate from her pop world and diversify her artistry.

Then came the noughties, when she released the Paula Abdul-penned Spinning Around, a disco-pop number that marked her return to the top of the charts. Its follow-up album *Fever*, became her most commercially successful album, with the gargantuan Can't Get You Out Of My Head dominating the airwaves, cementing her status as a pop juggernaut while proving that she was a musical force to be reckoned with.

The life-altering diagnosis

In 2005, while on her Showgirl tour, she was diagnosed with breast cancer. The remaining tour dates, including a headlining slot at the Glastonbury music festival were immediately cancelled as she underwent several months of treatment.

Her commitment to her fans became more evident despite potentially facing mortality. Her sister Dannii tearfully recalled that period in a *60 Minutes Australia* episode last year, saying that Kylie's sole focus was to resume the tour as soon as possible, even as her family wanted her to take a step back so she could completely recover. She kept her word and resumed the tour in late 2006

under a new title: Showgirl Homecoming. Ever dedicated to expanding her craft, she even returned with her tenth studio album the following year, X. From there onwards, it was business as usual as Kylie continued to release more albums - Aphrodite, Kiss Me Once, Kylie Christmas and Golden while embarking on a string of tours as well as a few acting roles

Kylie reached another personal and professional triumph in 2019 – she headlined the year's Glastonbury festival, having had to cancel 14 years prior due to her ill health. She regarded the set as one of the most important performances she's ever done. It seemed like the pinnacle of her career at the time, but in true Kylie fashion, she kept going.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in 2020, she released her fifteenth studio album, *Disco* while simultaneously releasing her *Kylie Minogue Wines* range. *Disco* topped the charts in the UK (arguably her biggest market) and brought her an unprecedented achievement: it made her the first female artist in the UK to have a number-one album across five consecutive decades.

A rare artistic revival

Little did Kylie know that her next era was about to usher in another Minogue renaissance. In May of 2023, she put out the bouncy electropop number *Padam Padam* and it quickly began to go viral on social media, with fans dubbing the phenomenon a Padamic. The single allowed Kylie to join the likes of Diana Ross and Cher as one of four women artists with a UK top ten hit in each of the last five decades. What was most interesting about the song's success was not its virality but how it sparked conversations about older female musicians and ageism.

Despite gaining a new generation of younger fans who discovered it on TikTok around the world, fans in the UK noticed that the song lacked airplay on their local stations, namely BBC's Radio 1. Many took to social media to express their confusion and frustration, with some even accusing the station of ageism and sexism - resulting in the station issuing a statement in response while subse quently playlisting the track. The *Padamic* didn't stop there –

she took home her second *Grammy* win last year for Best Pop Dance Recording, another rare feat for a female artist past her fifties. While on the red carpet at last year's event, she said that the single's success and its 2023 parent album Tension has further inspired her, fueling her desire to do more.

... and she's far from finished

SHE released her seventeenth album, Tension II in October 2024 and is currently travelling the world with her Tension tour, having just wrapped its Asian leg. Simultaneously, the soon-to-be 57 vear-old also returned to the small screen with a role as herself on the brand new Netflix mystery series The Residence

With the ever-shifting entertainment and music industry that seems to value social media attention, sensationalism and even controversy to sell or be relevant, Kylie Minogue has effortlessly shown that her star power is rooted in endurance. When a CBS interviewer asked her in 2023 how long she planned to continue her career, she responded, "Ask my knees! Ask my knees, which have been stomping on stages for years and years and years in stupid high heels!" Is this longevity attributed to her sheer determination, or is she just lucky, lucky, lucky? The

answer remains to be seen. However, it's clear as day that she has no plans of slowing down, as the world continues to bear witness to what she will do next.

Zukhairi Ahmad shares his passion for the sport and hopes to inspire others

N a bustling urban landscape like Kuala Lumpur, many people take to the pavement for their daily runs. But as the sun rises higher and temperatures climb, it may be time to consider a change: trail running.

This invigorating and liberating sport offers not just physical challenges but an enthralling connection with nature. Zukhairi Ahmad, a prominent figure in Malaysia's trail running scene, shares his journey and insights into what makes trail running more than just a way to stay fit - it's a means of personal evolution.

A journey from the ring to the trail Zukhairi's athletic background involves serious combat sports, where he trained as a professional Muay Thai fighter. Since 2008, he has made a name for himself in the running world, initially dabbling in road running before discovering the rugged charm of trail challenges.

His transition is an inspiring story for anyone considering a new path in their fitness journey. "I was drawn to trail running because of the challenge and the connection with nature," he revealed.

What captivated him was the way trail running offered a remarkably different experience from traditional running. The allure lies in the unwritten obstacles and the raw beauty of nature."Coming from a combat sports background, I've always valued resilience and adaptability - two key aspects of trail running. The ever-changing terrain and the mental toughness required felt like an extension of my training philosophy.

The transformational moment

Every trail runner has that defining moment, that experience that solidifies their passion for the sport. For Zukhairi, this happened during one particular moment

"During one of my early trail runs, I reached a peak just as the sun was rising," he recalls. "It wasn't about the speed or the distance; it was about feeling present, pushing past limits and realising that trail running isn't just a sport. It's an experi-ence! That was when I knew I wanted to explore it further.

Discovering Malaysia's best trails Malaysia boasts a stunning array of trails and Zukhairi has explored many of them. His favourites tell their own stories, each filled with unique challenges and breathtaking sights.

ings. There's also Cameron Highlands, where the high-altitude paths provide a spectacular backdrop with lush greenery. Bukit Kiara in Kuala Lumpur is a go-to spot for many local runners, combining flowing trails with an elevation that keeps

the adrenaline pumping. However, these trails come with their challenges. Zukhairi recalls an unforgettable experience during his selfsupported trail run when he miscalculated the difficulty and ran out of water. "It was a real test of mental strength and decision-making. That run taught me the importance of preparation and respecting the unpredictability of nature," he recalls. Another moment was at the Rinjani Ultra Trail in Indonesia. "I wasn't fully

prepared for the high altitude and I was hit by Acute Mountain Sickness (AMS). The dizziness, nausea and headache were intense.

The intersection of physical and

mental well-being Besides the breathtaking views and the thrill of adventure, trail running is a beneficial exercise for both body and mind. "The uneven terrain forces you to engage stabilising muscles, reducing the risk of overuse injuries common in road numing. Plus, the softer ground is easier on the joints," he points out. Mentally, the grounding effect of run-ning in nature is profound. He highlights

that it fosters patience and teaches run-ners to stay present, effectively offering a reset from the overwhelming routines of urban life. Whether navigating technical paths or tackling steep inclines, the sweet

spot of focus and resilience attained during a trail run often transcends the physical act itself, creating a meditative experience.

Challenges along the way But it's not all sunshine and clear skies. Trail runners like Zukhairi face common challenges that require clever strategies to conquer. The unpredictable terrain and weather necessitate adaptability, while long runs can bring about mental fatigue. Zukhairi breaks down those daunting stretches into manageable sections, anchoring his focus on the moment

rather than the miles ahead. Preparation is key. Before heading into the wild, Zukhairi emphasises the importance of a well-planned training regimen that includes strength training for stability, studying course routes, and ensuring hydration and nutrition strategies suit the demands of both the environment and the distance.

Essential gear for trail running

The right gear often bolsters a good run-ning experience. Zukhairi recommends several must-haves for anyone embarking on a trail-running adventure in Malaysia's diverse terrain. Trail shoes provide the grip needed for both wet and rocky trails, while a hydration vest ensures runners remain adequately fueled. He also suggests lightweight gear like a rain jacket to adapt to sudden weather changes. He recommends salt tablets or gels to replen-ish electrolytes in the humid conditions common throughout the region.

Finding community in trail

running With social connections being vital in any sport, Zukhairi encourages aspiring trail runners to find a community. "Start by joining established communities for structured training and support," he says. 'You can train with experienced runners and learn the ropes.

'Social media is also a great way to discover local trail running communities; just reach out, show up consistently and

be open to learning. The best way to become part of a running family is to lace up, hit the trails and share the journey." Zukhairi is active on social media, such as Instagram and can be reached at the @zukhviri account.

Inspiring the next generation of

The allure of global trail running currently beckons Zukhairi as he sets his sights on some of the world's most esteemed races, including the Ultra-Trail du Mont-Blanc and the Ultra-Trail Mt. Fuji. These endeavours test the limits of endurance, challenging both body and mind and igniting his passion for adventure.

However, his ambitions extend beyond personal accolades as Zukhairi strides forward in his career – holding positions such as ASICS Malaysia Trail Coach, Garmin Trail Athlete and Marmot Sports Athlete. "My goal is to develop stronger, more resilient trail runners through structured strength and conditioning training. Many runners underestimate the importance of strength work, but it's a game-changer, especially for the demands of trail running. I want to bridge that gap by educating and guiding runners toward smarter, injury-free performance.'

Embrace the journey So, if you find yourself yearning for a change or simply a breath of fresh air amidst your routine, trail running could be the journey you need. Zukhairi's advice resonates here: "Don't overthink it – just start"

The beauty of trail running lies in exploration, learning and enjoying ev-ery step taken in nature's realm. Equip yourself well, respect the trails and most importantly, aim to have fun. As Zukhairi demonstrates, this sport is more than just about running; it's about embracing the journey that life presents.

The next time you lace up your shoes, ask yourself: Why not take a detour from the city and chase the horizon? The trails await and there's a wild adventure just around the bend.

We recently drove the all-wheel-drive variant so we will focus on that throughout this article.

Besides the obvious good looks and those truly iconic Sigma styled head-lights, the Omoda C9 is also the only locally assembled car that is available with a matte paint job, and that is one of the factors that many have been attracted to.

But it should be said that maintaining a matte paint job is never an easy task, little scratches don't just buff out, and repainting panels can be costly. A popular life hack to maintain the

paintjob is to have it wrapped in a similar colour so that scratches do not affect the original paint job.

Its size is the other attraction because it truly is a big car, which makes it an interesting proposition for those with a family.

Overall spaciousness is impressive while the boot space comes in at a mas-sive 660-litres, which is expandle to 1,783 litres with the seats collapsed.

And then there is the operational factor.

Powering the C9 is a 2.0-litre, turbocharged, four-cylinder engine making 261PS and 400Nm of torque.

That is more than plenty to get the C9 up to 100kph in just 8.6 seconds. Not par ticularly explosive, but the car does weigh-in at an eye-popping 1,876kg. In terms of fuel-consumption,

allwheel-drive powertrains (AWD) tend to naturally be on the higher end of the consumption spectrum. And that is true for the C9 AWD as well.

While the claimed fuel consumption is rated at 8.5-litres per 100km, the real-world figure that we saw during our drive puts it at about 9 litres per 100km.

Range though is quite decent, with the 65-litre fuel tank providing an official range of 765km, but we were seeing a range of between 570km to 640km during our drive.

So, it is not a particular expensive car to operate on day-to-day basis. And the AWD layout can be regarded as a safety system as well, particularly in slippery conditions.

It is also worth pointing out that the C9 rolls on 20-inch wheels, which look great and truly suits the overall design of the car. But big wheels and their tyres can be expensive to maintain over the long run. Having said that though, we should

also mention that the C9 comes with a spare tyre.

This may not seem like a big deal, but more and more manufacturers are opting to swap the spare tyre for a tyre repair kit,

and the last thing you want is to be stranded on the roadside not knowing how to use a repair kit. So, this is a plus point.

But how is the car really like?

It is a gem that just needs to be polished to be appreciated. While Chinese cars get a lot of praise for their design, powertrains and overall features, they can't yet get overall ergonomics.

But we truly believe that it is just a matter of time, and Chinese cars, includ-ing everything from Omoda, will be perfected in just one product cycle.

The ergonomics we are ranting about is the positioning of the centre console. It pushes your left knee inwards which makes the sitting position feel a little awkward when you want to rest your left

leg. The centre console is also placed a little too high for this writer's preference as well. But that's just a matter of personal preference.

The one thing that makes the C9 stand out from the rest of the crowd though is its suspension system.

The C9 comes with a multi-link suspension setup with adaptive suspension called Continuous Damping Control (CDC)

This suspension system works electronically to adapt the suspension to road conditions

You might think that this works like any other adaptive suspension, and you will not be all wrong, but the CDC system of the C9 works more seamlessly.

It works by calculating speed, steering input, body pitch, roll, bounce, road sur-face conditions and even brake and throttle behaviour.

It then adjusts the internal fluids of the suspension, thus softening and stiffening the suspension as needed. And all this

happens in mere milliseconds. The great thing with the CDC is that it works seamlessly, and you often do not feel the suspension stiffening or softening (which happens when you select one of the seven drive modes) unless you try to consciously feel for it.

While it will take an entire article of a thousand words to explain how it works and what makes it different than others, all that matters on the road is that it gives you a supple ride quality and when you want to get serious about cornering, it gives you superb control.

What about its features?

This is something that Chinese cars truly excel at - loading their cars with fea-

tures and then selling them at unbelievable prices. And the Omoda C9 delivers on this as well.

The interior comes with a massive 24.-6-inch curved screen that houses the infotainment system as well as the instrument cluster. In fact, it looks similar to the one found on the Omoda 5.

You also get a 14-speaker Sony sound system with one speaker embedded into the driver's headrest for a truly splendid audio experience. Besides that though, you get the usual

set of features such as ventilated front seats, shift paddles, heads-up display, electronic seats, 540° surround view camera and even powered rear seats with a reclinable back rest.

On the topic of back seats, what we truly like though it the b-pillar mounted air-conditioning vents. That is truly the way vents should be mounted at the back.

In terms of safety, the SUV comes with a Level 2.5 ADAS safety suite that gives you all the safety nets you could need in a car.

Verdict?

If you are already considering the C9 but still unsure, consider this review a gentle nudge towards you signing on the dotted line.

Refinement and comfort are the standout features of the C9 and the fact that it offers as much tech as it does is the sweet cherry at the top of a very nice cake.

GTS first street-legal 911 to feature lightweight performance hybrid powertrain

PORSCHE Malaysia, represented by Sime Darby Auto Performance, has announced the availability of the latest generation of the 911 sports car in Malaysia.

The Porsche 911 Carrera and the Carrera 4 GTS can now be ordered, with prices starting from RM1,430,000.

The new 911 Carrera 4 GTS becomes the first street-legal 911 to feature a light-

weight performance hybrid powertrain. The newly developed 3.6-litre system significantly enhances driving performance, allowing the model to accelerate from 0 to 100kph in just 3.0 seconds and

achieve a top speed of 312kph. Meanwhile, the 911 Carrera retains its 3.0-litre twin-turbo boxer engine, now upgraded for greater power and efficiency.

Porsche engineers drew inspiration from motorsport to develop the T-Hybrid system for the Carrera 4 GTS.

A newly designed electric exhaust gas turbocharger, equipped with an inte-grated electric motor, instantly boosts the turbocharger's speed, ensuring immediate power delivery. The turbocharger also functions as a

generator, generating up to 15PS of elec-

tric power from exhaust gases. Unlike previous models, which relied on two turbochargers, this new system operates efficiently with just one, providing a more dynamic and responsive experience. This motor delivers up to 150Nm of

additional torque and a power boost of up to 40kW.

A compact, high-voltage battery replaces the traditional starter battery, storing up to 1.9kWh of energy and oper-ating at 400 volts. The 12V onboard electrical system also benefits from a light-



mum torque of 450Nm. The Carrera Coupe accelerates from o to 100kph in 4.1 seconds (3.9 seconds with the Sport Chrono package) and reaches a top speed of 294kph.

Buyers can choose from seven different 19-/20-inch or 20-/21-inch wheel designs. For the first time, Exclusive Design wheels with carbon blades are available for the 911 Carrera, reducing drag and improving efficiency.

The 911 Carrera 4 GTS comes standard with 21-inch rear wheels fitted with 315/30 ZR 21 tyres, while the front uses 20-inch wheels with 245/35 ZR 20 tyres. Inside, Porsche merges traditional 911 design elements with modern technol-

ogy. The Porsche Driver Experience concept centers controls around the driver for ease of use

Key controls, including the driving mode switch and driver assistance settings, are positioned near the steering wheel. For the first time, the 911 features a start button on the left side of the wheel.

The new 911 Carrera will be available as a rear-wheel-drive Coupe, while the 911 Carrera 4 GTS will be offered in Coupe and Targa variants with standard all-wheel drive.

Zenvo's 1,850hp Mjolner hypercar

DANISH automaker Zenvo Automotive has revealed the Mjølner—an all-new 6.6-litre quad-turthe bocharged hybrid V12 engine that produces a staggering 1,850hp.

Designed for Zenvo's upcoming Aurora hypercar, Mjolner is claimed to be the most powerful V12 ever fitted to a road car, outpacing even Bugatti's 1,775hp Tourbillon.

The mid-mounted V12 alone generates 1,250hp at up to 9,800 RPM. Combined with a hybrid system, total output hits 1,850hp. The engine, codeveloped with British firm Mhale will enter production testing soon, with manufacturing to take place at Mahle's UK facility.

Built for real-world use, Mjolner is the first in a new modular engine series that could yield V-10, V-8, or V-6 variants

Only 100 units will be produced.

Zenvo chairman Jens Sverdrup noted the engine's record-setting power was unintentional: "We set out to push boundaries, not chase num-bers. This engine is all about delivering a visceral connection."

The Mjolner will debut in the car-bon-fiber-bodied Aurora, Zenvo's first all-new model since 2008.

Weighing under 1,300kg, the Aurora will be offered in two variants: the grand touring Tur (1,850hp, AWD with dual front electric motors) and the track-focused Agil (1,450hp, RWD with a single motor). Both use a bespoke 7-speed paddle-shift gearbox from Ricardo.

Zenvo targets 0–100kmh in 2.3 seconds for the Tur and 2.5 seconds for the Agil. The Tur is expected to reach 300kph in just nine seconds and top out at 450kph. Pricing has yet to be revealed, but

bears a closer resemblance to the Acura Integra, another model that shares its mechanical underpinnings

Unlike the Integra and Civic, which use conventional automatic gear levers, the Prelude adopts a button-based gear selector. Notably, Honda has confirmed that a manual transmission will not be offered.

One of the Prelude's standout

This system allows drivers to engage paddle shifters, delivering an experience similar to the Hyundai Ioniq 5 N's artificial gearbox, though in this case, there's a real internal combustion engine at work.

Honda explains that the "S+ Shift" mode optimises engine RPM control during acceleration and deceleration, resulting in a sharper and more responsive drive.

The driving experience is further enhanced by artificial engine sounds, which are pumped through the speakers.

A recent video from a Japanese YouTuber provided a deeper look at the Prelude's interior layout. The coupe features two rear seats, but the sharply sloping roofline restricts headroom in the back.

However, Honda has compen-sated for this with a practical approach – the rear seats fold nearly flat, and the Prelude's hatchback-style trunk opening makes loading bulkier items easier.

A compact storage compartment between the rear seats adds to the

interior's versatility. Unlike the Integra, which offers

a third seat in the rear, the Prelude maintains a strict two-seat configuration.

While Honda has yet to release full full technical specifications, Japanese reports indicate that the Prelude has a shorter wheelbase than the Civic, but features wider front and rear tracks.

It also borrows high-performance components from the Civic Type R, including its adaptive dampers and dual-axis front suspension, designed to enhance han-

Red Bull should complain less: Norris

RED BULL should complain less about other teams and focus more on doing a better job with their own, according to McLaren's Formula One championship leader Lando Norris.

Norris goes into today's Bahrain Grand Prix a point clear of Red Bull's Max Verstappen, winner in Japan last week-end, after three rounds.

McLaren ended Red Bull's reign as world champions last season, although Verstappen took his fourth successive drivers' title, and there has been plenty of talk about where their speed is coming from

Red Bull boss Christian Horner has

pointed to a coming technical directive (TD), clamping down on front wing flex, as a potential game-changer from race nine but Norris dismissed that.

"We're all fully within the rules. We're doing a good job. Red Bull have had plenty of time to do the same thing as us and they're not," he told British media reporters.

"It is more that they should do a better job rather than keep complaining about

Job rather than keep complaining about things," added the Briton, who was run-ner-up to Verstappen last year. "We respect the FIA doing what they're doing and we're happy that they keep try-ing to correct things because we don't

want anyone outside of those rules, but the last ones didn't affect us," he added. "I don't know if the new ones will or not

but there are plenty of things that Red Bull do that also push the limits just as much. "So we can also play that game, but we focus on ourselves rather than

complaining about others." Norris said people who judged from

Norris said people who judged from online videos were "a bit clueless. "How do they know it's the rear wing that's flexing?," he asked. "They don't, it could be the whole car. "So, you know, people can just come up with what they want but really they have absolutely no idea." – Reuters

BRYSON DECHAMBEAU, the man who BRYSON DECHAMBEAU, the man who once planned to overpower Augusta National, is in contention again at the Masters, where he has found patience and understanding crucial to balancing

his naturally aggressive game. "It's a daily battle," the reigning US Open champion admitted after firing a 4-under 68 yesterday for a 7-under total that had him one shot off the lead.

"It's not easy to try and be more con-servative when you know the leaders are starting to run away," he said, adding that the intricacies of Augusta National only compound that problem. "You get these little shelves in certain

areas and these little fingers that you've

got to hit the ball into, and you've got to hit a cut or a draw. You have to have every shot in the bag. "It's just difficult to try to accomplish, I would say, just the goal of just being patient and being understanding." DeChambeau has a mixed history at August Distance where he finished field

Augusta National, where he finished tied for 21st as an amateur in 2016 but outside the top 25 in his next six starts. That included missed cuts in 2022

and 2023 before he finally seemed to find his way last year, when he shot an opening-round 65 and was tied for the lead through 36 holes on the way to a share of sixth place.

Along the way, he provoked the ire of

fans of the iconic Georgia course, notably in 2020 when he claimed the muscle he'd packed on made it a "par 67" for

him. This year, he's a darling of Augusta patrons – some no doubt won over not only by DeChambeau's golf – now largely showcased on the LIV Golf tour – but also by his engaging YouTube channel

"I think the patrons have always been great here," DeChambeau said. "Even when I was in my trying times, I feel like there was still a lot of support.

"Now it just feels like a bolster of energy everywhere. It's quite different, and it's a lot of fun." - AFP



Exception to the rule

Salah expensive to keep but Liverpool couldn't afford to lose him

SO now Mohamed Salah, to adapt his own phrase, is very much more in than out. All it took, it seemed, was for the Egyptian's goals to dry up for the first time in a remarkable season for Liverpool to present Salah with a contract he would sign.

Maybe Salah's occasional willingness to go public in frustration has been justified. go public in rrustration has been justified. Or perhaps Liverpool's quiet approach has. Saying nothing in public did not equate to doing nothing in private. With Salah signed up and Virgil van Dijk making progress in his own contract talks, director of football Richard Hughes muy conclude that two out of three inst

may conclude that two out of three isn't bad.

Three expiring contracts provided the hospital pass. The apocalyptic scenario was that Salah, Van Dijk and Trent Alexander-Arnold would all go, leaving Liverpool with a huge bill to rebuild their side and, almost certainly, a weaker team next season.

Even Salah's recent dip in form has out-lined his importance: when he stopped

He will not be a pauper with his new deal but Liverpool's cost-conscious own-ers clearly decided the false economy would be to let him leave on a free trans-

Their reluctance to give lengthy con-tracts to thirtysomethings has been justi-fied by the fortunes of Salah's peers. Gini Wijnaldum, Sadio Mane, Roberto Firmino and Jordan Henderson are not the forces they once were, and are not burdens on Liverpool's wage bill. Salah and Van Dijk can be the exceptions to every rule, however.

The forward's new deal will take him up to his 35th birthday. But – and despite the stutter in the last month – he is having a career-best campaign in his thirties; in

more ways than one, given that he has 32 goals to accompany his 22 assists. It is unlikely to earn him the *Ballon d'Or*; Liverpool's relatively early Champions League exit and his own underwhelming display against Paris Saint-Germain should see to that. But he would still have bordered on the irreplaceable.

In part, because of a consistency that has meant Salah has had no off-year in

eight seasons at Anfield, but also because his departure would have required a new configuration of the for-ward line; he has been so good that two top-class players would be needed to

players would be needed to compensate. As Arne Slot put it, sim-ply but effectively, "what makes him special is he scores goals". And far more than anyone else. Luis Diaz had a scoring spell and Cody Gakpo has produced the best form of his Liver pool

Liverpool career, but each could accelerate in Salah's

slipstream, when he was setting such a pace in the goalscoring charts that it rendered it easier for others to follow. Now Salah's stay at Liverpool will extend to a decade. He could reach 300 goals in their colours.

The status of Liverpool's greatest player generally comes down to debates about the merits of Steven Gerrard and Kenny Dalglish. Salah is giving himself a greater chance of entering the

conversation as an equal. And his motives have never been purely financial, not least

because he already earns a lot. Outsiders concluded Salah and Saudi Arabia made sense; he rarely seemed to. When Liverpool rejected a £150 million (RM825m) bid two years ago, they did not

a further four. He wanted to stay; his complaints when he felt the club were too small to facilitate that showed as much.

Salah may have been astute enough to realise that he was already in a desirable position, with one of the world's best teams built around him. The grass was not greener elewhere

Meanwhile, a manager who tried to bore everyone into submission by not talk-ing about contracts started to suggest that

ing about contracts started to suggest that he was eager to keep his top scorer. Now there is no doubt that Slot got what he wanted: a vote of confidence from the forward in the new manager. Salah and Jurgen Klopp were very good for each other, despite the fractious end. Slot has spared Salah some defensive duties – aided by Dominik Szoboszlai's ability to cover vast amounts of ground – and has been repaid with goals.

and has been repaid with goals. Salah's last seven appearances have only produced two goals, both against Southampton. It would be premature to suggest he has

It would be premature to suggest he has been sent spiralling into decline; similar suggestions this time last year have been emphatically disproved. "We have brought the maximum of his qualities," said Slot; only his 44-goal debut year for Klopp compares. Perhaps his recent relapse does indi-cate, however, that Salah cannot sustain his brillinge for acting campaigne, and

his brilliance for entire campaigns, and he tends to make flying starts.

It is a method that is propelling Liverpool to the title, and after the defeat to Fulham, he has now provided a timely boost to morale. It may mean in future that Salah's

minutes have to be rationed to keep him fresher for longer.

Both Slot and Klopp have tended to take the view that his thirst for goals is such that they would rather keep him on.

But now Liverpool are keeping Salah on in a different sense. And amid the delight, there may be a sense of relief. – The Independent
